"The shipwreck of social welfare and health care – a hell machine has been born in Finland"

Recent events in the Finnish heal-thcare system have caused concern and indignation, especially over Professor Lasse Lehtonen's recent statements. His incisive description of the "hell machine" brought about by Sanna Marin's health and social services reform has created inefficient and even life-threatening medical care in Finland.

According to Lehtonen, people die unnecessarily, and a poorly functioning and non-existent social and health care system has been created in Finland. The life expectancy of Finns has already begun to decline, and comparisons with the health care systems of Western Europe reveal glaring short-comings.

A key problem is that medical care in Finland is inefficient compared to other countries. According to Lehtonen, the lack of a family doctor system and the shocking bureaucracy in medical records have led to doctors spending more time on paperwork than on treating patients. By way of com-parison, the effective health care systems in other Western European countries are of a completely different size. In countries where the family doctor model is used, one doctor can treat 30 patients per day, in Finland the corresponding figure is often six patients. One can be particularly critical of the electronic health record system, which in Finland has developed into an exaggerated electro-chronic bureaucracy. In Finland, doctors spend too much time in front of the computer with pa-tient records, which means less time to see and care for patients. This is not only a question of inefficiency, but also a life-threatening situation, as Mr Lehtonen points out.

in the service network of health centres, which may further aggravate the situation. There is therefore an urgent need to take action to improve the health care situation. One aspect of the situation in Finland is that doctors have the same monthly salary regardless of whether they work a lot or very little.

Extinguished lanterns are also used to decide on the ordering of consultants and digital services. In other words, you study and examine until you lose sight and then you are already in the intensive care unit. Who will fix this problem if things go really wrong, asks teacher Petri Salo from Luvia.

When private doctors participate in this work in one way or another, the income level of a hard-working, knowledgeable and effective doctor can increase. Is it such a big problem that no chang-es can be made?

Proposed emergency measures:

- 1. The introduction of the GP model is necessary to ensure individual patient care and better patient knowledge for doctors.
- 2. Private doctors must be involved in the practice of the practice in order to guarantee fast-er and better treatment for patients.
- 3. EMR systems need to move towards an agile and simplified "karvalakki" model that saves time for doctors and enables more efficient patient care.

Now is the time to act so that the Finnish healthcare system can move out of the shadow of the "hell machine" towards an efficient and patient-friendly future. Orpo's Government must take re-sponsibility, correct the shortcomings in social welfare and health care and take concrete measures so that every Finn can trust that the health care system works.




Diversity in sports activities for seniors during Ikiliikkuja Week on 11–17 March

National Veterans' Day in Vaasa this year

Veterans' Day 2024 will be celebrated on Saturday 27.4.2024 in Vaasa. The main event will be held in the Bothnia Hall.

eterans' Day has been celebrated in Finland only since the 1980s. The reason for this can be found in the years after the war, when Finland was obliged to the war under the Paris Peace Treaty and one of the losing countries. As a result, those who fought the war were not valued and were even blamed for the defeat.

In the 1960s and 1970s, the appreciation of veterans was at its lowest. Although the majority of Finns did not share this view, it was not possible to speak on behalf of veterans.

In the 1980s, respect for veterans slowly began to grow. Colonel Adolf Ehrnrooth broke the silence among the veterans and told the younger generations about the wars they had been. With this, the veterans' experiences and sacrifices began to receive the appreciation they deserved.

The first National Veterans' Day was celebrated in Lahti in 1987 in connection with Finland's 70th anniversary. The day was chosen for 27 April because it is the anniversary of the end of the Lapland War. Today, National Veterans' Day is an important day to honour all veterans of Finland's wars and their sacrifices. The day is celebrated in many different ways, including the raising of flags, the laying of a wreath and festive events.

New S-market opened its doors in Sundom



The Spruce Bark Beetle Threatens Our Spruce Forests

The spruce bark beetle (Ips typographus) is a beetle measuring about half a centimeter that poses the most significant economic threat to spruce trees in forest stands. Its reproduction primarily occurs in trees that have fallen due to wind or are weakened.

he spruce bark beetle reproduces in the inner bark of trees, both living and dead wood. The adult beetles overwinter in the forest soil and in the trees when environmental conditions are not conducive to reproduction. When conditions are right, adult bark beetles search up to half a mile in the guest for a vulnerable host. When they find a host, they bore through weakened bark to create tunnels where they can mate and lay eggs. They emit pheromones to attract more individuals to the tree. Two to five weeks after infestation, they may migrate to another host and repeat the process. When the larvae hatch, they feed and pupate under the bark. Up to three generat-ions can be produced per year.

Spruce bark beetles communicate with each other by using pheromones, compounds, or mixtures that convey messages. Some electrophysiological and behavioral statistics show that spruce bark beetles can not only sense odor messages directly from other spruce bark beetles but also certain compounds from trees.

The spruce bark beetle can form a symbiotic relationship with certain Ophiostomatales fungi. These wood-living beetles supply fungi as a com-plement to their diet. The spruce bark beetle has the ability to spread rapidly across large areas. During outbreaks, spruce bark beetles can overwhelm tree defenses. Alt-hough they are specialized in spruce, they do not exist throughout the entire spruce ran-

ge. They also cannot survive in the northernmost spruce forests due to insufficient climate variations.

Impact

Ecologically, the spruce bark beetle has a significant impact on both the eco-logical and econo-

mic environment of spruce forests. Together with storm events, bark beetle outbreaks are considered by some to be one of the most important natural disturbances in this region. Some researchers argue that this beetle is a keystone species, in part because it has an unusually large number of relationships with other organisms in the community and drama-tically alters its environment.

Bark beetle outbreaks generally help renew the forest and promote the evo-lution of stronger, more resistant trees by initiating different adaptations to ward off their attacks.

Economic Impact

Bark beetles are associated with various types of fungi, each with different basic ecological roles. Several fungal pathogens can be transferred to spruces by bark beetles, and one of the most damaging is a species of blue-stain fungus, Ophiostoma polonicum, which can kill healthy trees by blocking water

flow and causing them to wither. It also stains the wood with blue streaks, destroying its commercial value. The results of such bark beetle out-breaks can be devastating for the forestry industry in the area due to the time it takes for natural regression to occur.

Detection

Bark beetles typically attack the lower and middle parts of stems. Infected trees are easy to recognize by concentrations of brown dust from the bark at the base of the trunk. However, visibly infected trees with green crowns may lack bark due to larval and woodpecker activity. Other common ways to de-tect infection include the presence of reddish-brown dust (frass) in the bark's crevices, many round exit holes, or small resin droplets being forced out from the bark. Large populations can be detected from a distance through patches of red foliage.

Conservation

Measures for bark beetle outb-

reaks are controversial in places like Šumava National Park in Bohemia. Some suggest that outbreaks should be allowed to run their course, even if it means losing a significant portion of the forest. Others, including the forestry industry, request intervention. Some experts argue that salvage logging tends to have a greater negative impact on vege-tation than the bark beetle outbreak alone.

Preventive and Control Methods Several methods have been proposed to prevent the onset of bark beetle outbreaks. Some suggest using "trap trees" at the beginning of each repro-ductive cycle. This should be done in March, May, and at the end of June or early July. The trap trees should be debarked when clear larval galleries with small larvae are found. Another method is sanitation logging, removing sect-ions of trees at the first signs of infestation. Pheromone traps can capture thousands of bark beetles. However, their real utility in reducing tree da-mage is debated: some studies have found a significant reduction in damage in sites with pheromone traps, while others have found no effect or even a slight increase in the risk of new attacks. The effectiveness of pheromone traps can vary depending on local conditions.

Minimizing stress factors that can weaken trees, such as drought and pests, can also help prevent bark beetle infestation.

Summary

The spruce bark beetle poses a serious threat to our spruce forests, and ma-naging its impact requires active efforts from forest owners and the forestry management community. Effective control measures, combined with forestry management practices, can help limit the spread of the spruce bark beetle and preserve the health and economic value of our forests.

Copernicus: 2023 - the hottest year in history

GLOBAL CLIMATE HIGHLIGHTS 2023: Unprecedented Warmth Sets Alarming Records

The year 2023 has solidified its place in history as the hottest year ever recorded, pushing global temperatures perilously close to the 1.5°C limit, according to the Copernicus Climate Change Service (C3S). Monitored by the European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecasts on behalf of the European Commission and funded by the EU, C3S's findings reveal alarming trends in various climate indicators, showcasing record-breaking conditions throughout the year.

Key highlights from the Global Climate Highlights report, primarily based on the ERA5 reanalysis dataset, underscore the severity of climate extremes and their underlying drivers, including greenhouse gas concentrations, El Niño, and natural variations.

Global Surface Air Temperature Highlights:

2023 stands as the warmest calendar year in global temperature records dating back to 1850.

The global average temperature in 2023 reached 14.98°C, surpassing the previous highest annual value in 2016 by 0.17°C.

A staggering 0.60°C warmer than the 1991-2020 average and 1.48°C warmer than the pre-industrial le-

vel of 1850-1900.

A 12-month period ending in January or February 2024 is likely to exceed the 1.5°C pre-industrial level.

For the first time on record, every day in 2023 surpassed 1°C above the pre-industrial level, with close to 50% of days exceeding 1.5°C.

Annual average air temperatures set records or approached record levels across major ocean basins and continents, excluding Australia.

Each month from June to December 2023 was warmer than the corresponding month in any previous year.

July and August 2023 ranked as the warmest two months on record, making the boreal summer the warmest season recorded.

September 2023 had the largest temperature deviation above the 1991–2020 average in the ERA5 dataset.

Globally, December 2023 was the warmest on record, with an average temperature of 13.51°C, exceeding the 1991-2020 average by 0.85°C and the pre-industrial level by 1.78°C.

Ocean Surface Temperature Highlights:

Global average sea surface temperatures (SSTs) remained persistently high from April to December, reaching record levels.

A transition to El Niño occurred in 2023, following the end of La Niña in spring, declared by the WMO in July.

High SSTs, particularly in the North Atlantic, contributed signifi-

cantly to the record-breaking global SSTs.

Unprecedented SSTs led to marine heatwaves worldwide, affecting regions such as the Mediterranean, Gulf of Mexico, Caribbean, Indian Ocean, North Pacific, and much of the North Atlantic.

European Temperature Highlights:

Europe experienced its second-warmest year in 2023, surpassing the 1991-2020 average by 1.02°C but trailing 2020, the warmest year, by 0.17°C.

Above-average temperatures prevailed for 11 months, with September being the warmest on record.

The European winter (December 2022 – February 2023) ranked as the second-warmest on record.

The average temperature for the European summer (June-August) was 19.63°C, making it the fifth-warmest on record, exceeding the average by 0.83°C.

European autumn (September-November) had an average temperature of 10.96°C, the second-warmest on record, just 0.03°C cooler than autumn 2020.

These alarming climate statistics highlight the urgent need for global action to mitigate and adapt to the consequences of climate change, underlining the pressing importance of international cooperation to address this unprecedented challenge.

EXHIBITIONS

In Eero Järnefelt's exhibition fascinates the big and small themes of nature



From 5.4.–25.8.2024, the Ateneum Art Museum will host an exhibition covering the entire career of the masterful nature and portrait artist Eero Järnefelt (1863–1937), who sought emotion and truth. The exhibition presents the extensive work of a cosmopolitan cultural family and the artist's significance for Finnish art and Finnishness. Diverse descriptions of nature make one wonder whether the nature depicted by the artist in the 1800s and 1900s still exists.

arnefelt sought to capture the essential elements of his works
Eero Järnefelt's art stems from his family's interesting cultural background and is characterised by the pursuit of essential features from nature as well as people. The artist was able to depict his subjects with detailed precision, delicate atmosphere and festive monumentality.

The exhibition sheds light on diffe-

rent aspects of Järnefelt's conception of landscape and people. It also provides information about the Järnefelt family, his family, study trips, home conditions in Suviranna on Lake Tuusula and the connection of his art to the Finnish thinking of his time.

Järnefelt's paintings of nature and landscapes from Koli make you wonder whether the nature depicted by the artist in the 1800s and 1900s still exists — and what our relationship is to nature and landscapes today. In the artist's works, the magnificent landscapes of danger as well as the delicate details of the buttercup and the casserole are treated equally.

Järnefelt is also known for his portraits of prominent figures of his time. Included are interesting portraits of journalist, doctor and Member of Parliament Tekla Hultin and Mathilda Wrede, who dedicated her life to helping prisoners and the underprivileged.

The exhibition also includes a route designed for visitors with children, which encourages people to look at the works and discuss them from the

children's point of view.

The curator of the exhibition is Timo Huusko, Chief Curator of the Ateneum. Most of the works come from the collection of the Finnish National Gallery, but there are also plenty of loans from other museums and private collections. More than 200 works are on display.

The family's influence on Finnish cultural life was enormous

In the exhibition, you can also get to know the Järnefelt family and close family, whose influence on art and culture at the turn of the 1800s and 1900s was enormous. The Järnefelt siblings, critic Kasper, writer Arvid, musician Armas and later known as Jean Sibelius's spouse Aino, are remembered not only as authors of visual art, literature and music, but also as part of a wider network of cultural actors.

Eero Järnefelt's father, Alexander Järnefelt, made the development of the Finnish national movement his life's mission. Mother Elisabeth Järnefelt is especially remembered for her literary salon, the most famous participant of which was Juhani Aho.

s part of his working visit to Türkiye, President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyy met with President of the Republic of Türkiye Recep Tayyip Erdoğan.

The negotiations took place in a narrow circle and with the participation of delegations.

"Talks between Ukraine and Türkiye are always sincere and fruitful. The obvious priority is that we are trying to enhance our security and our strength as much as possible, to quickly restore a just peace for all our land and all our people, and for the Black Sea region," said the Head of the Ukrainian state during a meeting with media representatives following the negotiations with the President of Türkiye in Istanbul.

Volodymyr Zelenskyy thanked Recep Tayyip Erdoğan and the people of Türkiye for their support of our state's independence and territorial in-tegrity and all our people. He separately expressed gratitude to the Tur-kish leader for efforts to release Ukrainian citizens from Russian captivity.

Operation to liberate Donbass has lasted more than two years - Gone according to plan?

n an article published by Izvestia two years ago, 25.2.22, Dmitry Abzalov, chairman of the Center for Strategic Communications, predicted that the operation to liberate Donbass and other regions would take about five days. The question now is - how has this prediction held up?

According to Abzalov, the operation should last for a baseline period, especially outside large cities. He mentioned that the eastern, central and southern regions could probably be liberated, and possibly a corridor to Transnistria could be madeall in about five days.

However, within almost two years, it is reasonable to ask, has everything gone according to plan? More than two years have passed since the liberation of Operation Donbass, and the situation raises concerns about how well the initial forecasts corresponded to reality.

Russia's chess icon Garry Kasparov ends up on extremist list -"An honor", says the champion

Russia's famous chess grandmaster Garry Kasparov has officially been added to the Russian extremist list published by Putin's regime on Wednesday. Kasparov, who has previously been highly critical of the Kremlin, responds to his new status as a "terrorist and extremist" with a comment that sheds light on the current political climate in Russia.



"An honor," Kasparov says ironically about being on the list of those whom the regime considers a threat. "That says more about Putin's fascist regime than it does about me."

Referring to the American politician Barry Goldwater, Kasparov quotes: "Extremism in the defense of freedom is not vice and moderation in the pursuit of justice is not a virtue!" The Master thus expresses his commitment to democratic values and his readiness to stand up for freedom and justice, regardless of the imposed labels of the regime.

At a time when opposition and decency seem to be classified as extremist acts by the Russian dictatorship, Kasparov continues to be a prominent voice for democracy and human rights. His placement on the extremist list can be seen as a symbol of the increasing pressure on critics and opposition figures in Russia, where expressions of opinion and the search for justice risk being characterized as threats to the regime.



This true color picture was assembled from Voyager 2 Saturn images obtained Aug. 4 [1981] from a distance of 21 million kilometers (13 million miles) on the spacecraft's approach trajectory. Three of Saturn's icy moons are evident at left. They are, in order of distance from the planet. Tethys, 1,050 km. (652 mi.) in diameter, Dione, 1,120 km. (695 mi.); and Rhea, 1,530 km. (951 mi.). The shadow of Tethys appears on Saturn's southern hemisphere. A fourth satellite, Mimas, is less evident, appearing as a bright spot a quarter-inch in in from the planet's limb about half an inch above Tethys, the shadow of Mimas appears on the planet about three-quarters of an inch directly above that of Tethys. The pastel and yellow hues on the planet reveal many contrasting bright and darker bands in both hemispheres of Saturn's weather system. The Voyager project is managed for NASA by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Pasadena, California, United States.
