Russia's economy: A façade of resilience that is crumbling

For months, the narrative surrounding Russia's economy has been characterized by a surprising resilience. Despite crippling sanctions, oil and gas revenues seemed to protect the nation from immediate collapse. Gross domestic product is said to rise, as a result of much more weapons now being produced than before. That increase in production does not benefit ordinary

However, a closer look reveals a history of accelerating deterioration, masked by temporary solutions and unsustainable practices. The initial effect of the sanctions was undeniable. The ruble plummeted, inflation skyrocketed and foreign companies fled. Nevertheless, Russia managed to stabilize the currency through capital controls and by exploiting its energy exports. However, this is a double-edged sword. High energy prices are a temporary blessing, but also a sign of global disruptions, and a future downturn could be catastrophic.

Beyond the headline figures, the picture darkens. Supply chains are in disarray, essential goods are becoming scarce and domestic industry is crippled by a lack of access to foreign technology and expertise. The long-term consequences of this isolation are profound. Social welfare programmes are strained, leading to a lowering of the standard of living for ordinary Russians.

The price of eggs has skyrocketed, to the extent that eggs are available in all stores. The price of new housing in Moscow has more than doubled. Ordinary Russians do not have any opportunity to buy a home, especially since favorable loans will end this summer. This is according to articles in pro-regime Moscow newspapers (and other than pro-regime ones do not exist nowadays). Interest rates on loans move around 18%. There have been cheaper housing loans, but they are likely to be discontinued

Unemployment is likely to be at a record low. We do not know, but can assume that a man who registers as unemployed is ordered to appear at a recruitment office. If all the unemployed – and there are enough – are sent to the front, the unemployment

rate will be low

Exports of gasoline have been suspended (as a sign that Ukraine has managed to destroy a significant part of the refineries). A week ago, Ukraine told us that a fuel depot near Vyborg had set on fire, 30 km from our border. But this information has only been partially confirmed. The export of sugar has also been banned.

Putin has already spoken about the need to reform taxation in Russia, which now has a 13% flat tax. Efforts are being made to prepare the population for a transition to progressive taxation in order to increase tax revenues. But the population is assured again and again that this only affects high-income people. And the increased tax revenues should go to social spending. It is not said that tax money would go to the war, but everyone should understand it anyway.

In the old Soviet Union, the command regularly consoled with claims of "how good it will be." Putin has now fallen into this old habit. By 2030, he will double the minimum wage (which is now below €200), and double the living space per person (which is now supposed to be 18 square meters). All houses with dwellings that do not meet the minimum requirements must be taken out of use.

The price level of everyday goods is less than the same as in the West. With a mi-

nimum wage of €200, it is not possible to maintain any standard of living, not one if the salary were to double.

Incidentally, about €200 is also the average pension in Russia. Should not guarantee a carefree old age.

The brain drain is increasing as skilled workers seek opportunities abroad. This exodus further weakens the country's innovation capacity and future growth prospects. The Kremlin may project an image of economic control, but the reality is a ticking time bomb. The real costs of the war are accumulating and the foundations of the Russian economy are being eroded. Without a significant change of course, Russia faces a future of stagnation and decline.

Putin's trip to China last week can hardly be described as anything other than a poor little brother's trip to his rich big brother to beg for help. And help will be given to Russia, because it is in China's interest that the war in Ukraine lasts as long as possible. As the Russian army has bled to death in the fields of eastern Ukraine, it is China's army that will be the most powerful on the entire Eurasian continent. The decision-makers in the countries of Southeast Asia will listen to Beijing instead of Moscow. And if China should ever need more territory in the direction of Siberia, then Russia has no strength to oppose.

Eastern spirituality in Tikanoja 18.5-27.10.2024

The exhibition that will open at the Tikanoja Art Home this summer sheds light on the perceptions of Eastern spirituality in art in Finland from the 1800s to the present day through cultural-historical objects and nearly a hundred works. The exhibition presents several works by Ilona Harima, who was born in Vaasa, some of which are on public display for the first time.

The exihibion was presented by Maaria Salo on May 17.

Ideas about the mystical East and about Eastern spirituality have been produced and repeated in Western culture over the centuries. For example, yoga, meditation, Eastern dance or Eastern religions have been sources of inspiration for several artists. The exhibition on display at the Tikanoja Art Home presents the theme with the help of cultural-historical objects and nearly a hundred works of art in Finland from the 1800s onwards.

The exhibition is based on Nina Kokkinen's research project. She is a Postdoctoral Researcher at the Donner Institute. She has investigated the artists' interest in Eastern spirituality, to which in addition to Buddhism, Hinduism and beliefs generally related to Asian culture there is also a strong element of esoteric spirituality.

"A lot of discussion related to Eastern spirituality was also related in Finland to Theosophy, which artists became interested in already at the end of the 1800s," says Kokkinen, whose research work has previously also led to several exhibition projects.

Genuine desire to understand

The Tikanoja Art Home features works by Ilona Harima, who is a significant artist from the point of view of Eastern spirituality. Some of the works are part of Tikanoja's art collection. Harima was a theosophist, a fellow Freemason and she was also one of the founding members of Finland's first Buddhist association. Harima painted Eastern miniatures from the 1930s onwards and used Buddhist images from Tibet, among other things.

The exhibition also presents Akseli Gallen-Kallela's art and objects he collected during his travels. In the shadow of colonialism, many exotic objects were brought to Europe and they often became part of the museums' collections or the interior of studios. The exhibition reflects the problems of perceptions related to Eastern spirituality, but also the artists' genuine desire to understand and learn about other cultures.

In recent times, Eastern spirituality has become part of popular culture and the motley landscape of new spirituality. It lives in people's minds as a longing for aesthetics, escapism, and a desire to examine life from a spiritual perspective. The exhibition also includes works by contempo-

rary artists, such as Outi Heiskanen, J.O. Mallander and Silja Rantanen, who draw from Eastern traditions and philosophies - and offer views on spiritual growth and liberation from the shackles of the mind.

Rare finds through mapping of works

For the exhibition, a nationwide survey of works has been carried out, especially on works by female artists with connections to Vaasa. In addition to Ilona Harima, works by Eva Bremer, Meri Genetz and Lyyli Visanti have been mapped. The works that have been highlighted in public and private collections and the information about them will also be utilised in further research.

-We have found rare works that have not previously been shown in exhibitions, and gained a slightly better idea of the production of these four female artists, says curator Noora Lehtovuori from Vaasa's museums.

Among other things, a portrait that Eva Bremer has painted of the Persian-born dancer Enayet Hanoum was found through the research project. Kokkinen identified as the same dancer as the one Eemu Myntti has painted several portraits of. His works are part of Tikanoja's collection. The exhibition also includes Bremer's work Morning Gymnastics, which is part of the museum's collection and which nicely illustrates the close contact between Eastern dance and yoga in the early 1900s.

The exhibition includes several loans from art museums and private collections, which are rarely shown.

149 defibrillators in Vaasa

More defibrillators in Vaasa: the latest at Länsimetsä and Variska schools

A defibrillator is a device that aims to restore the heart to beat at a normal pace. There are also heart strikers in several properties of the City of Vaasa, and the newest ones can be found at Länsimetsä and Variska schools.

It is estimated that approximately 40 Vaasa residents suffer sudden cardiac arrest in everyday life every year. In cardiac arrests, the first helper is often a passerby.

Starting CPR and using a cardiopulmonary resuscitator within 3 to 5 minutes of cardiac arrest multiplies the chances of survival. Therefore, it is important for eve-

ryone to know where the nearest heart attacker is located.

There are currently a total of 149 heart attackers in Vaasa. There have been 18 more devices compared to

a until last year. The nearest heart striker can be located in the 112 Suomi app and the defi.fi service.

Lifti's prices will be harmonized: Easier and clearer ticket purchases

From 1 July 2024, the pricing of the Vaasa region's public transport Liftis will become more uniform and customer-friendly. The goal is to simplify ticket purchases and make it more transparent for all travelers

Currently, the price of a one-way ticket varies depending on the payment method. For example, a mobile ticket in the Waltti app costs €3.00, while the cheapest ticket with a travel card costs

€1.33. The trip can also be paid for with contactless payment (€1.50), cash (€2.00) or via partner apps (€1.50 – €3.00).

According to the proposal, all payment methods except cash will cost the same price for a one-way trip for adults in zone A from 1 July 2024. The price will then be €1.70. The ticket price for cash payments will be increased to €2.20.

"We want to make pricing even clearer and more customer-friendly," says Public Transport Specialist Anastassia Backlund. "After the change, bus tickets will still be among the cheapest in Finland."

Harmonised prices:

One-way adult zone A: €1.70 (all payment methods except cash)

One-way adult zone A (cash): €2.20 Children and young people under 17 years old: 50% discount on adult tickets

Group discount (minimum 10 people): 30% discount on adult tickets

The changes will enter into force on 1 July 2024.

New Tick-Borne Threat Emerges in Finland:

Neoerlichiosis Can Cause Long-Term Fever Climate change brings new threats to our health. One such concern is a tick-borne bacterial infection called "Neoerlichiosis," with the first case confirmed in Finland. Infectious disease specialist Ulla Hohenthal warns of this new danger in the medical journal Mediuutiset.

The primary symptom of Neoerlichiosis is a prolonged fever that can last for weeks. Diagnosis can be challenging because the disease is still rare, and its symptoms can mimic other tick-borne illnesses like Lyme disease. Fortunately, treatment for Neoerlichiosis is effective with antibiotics, the same ones used for Lyme disease.

The risk of tick-borne diseases increases with climate change as ticks thrive in warm and humid weather. It's crucial to protect yourself from tick bites by wearing long clothing and using insect repellent. Additionally, monitor tick bites and seek medical attention if symptoms develop.

The discovery of Neoerlichiosis serves as a reminder to be vigilant for emerging infec-

tious diseases. By following public health guidelines and practicing tick prevention, we can minimize the risk of contracting this and other tick-borne illnesses.

Families with children have found paradise: Almost four children are born per woman in Larsmo!

The birth rate is plummeting – only one municipality has crossed the threshold for renewal!

Fewer and fewer children are born in Finland. The downward trend that started in 2010 continues, and now there are also large differences between municipalities and regions.

Tampere, Joensuu, Turku and Savonlinna have the lowest numbers of births. In these towns with over 20,000 inhabitants the total fertility rate was only 1.07 to 1.12 children per woman in 2020 to 2023.

But luckily there are glimmers of light! In some municipalities, children are worth a treasure. In Larsmo, Pyhäntä and Merijärvi, 3–3.6 children are born per woman! In

"Municipalities with a birth rate of more than three children per woman are now a rarity in Finland. In the early 2000s, there were still 17, now only four," says Juhana Nordberg from Statistics Finland.

The larger the municipality, the fewer children. The statistics reveal a clear link: the smaller the municipality, the more likely it is that more children will be born.

The total fertility rate for the whole country was 1.26 in 2023, which is the lowest birth rate since 1776. This means that a woman gives birth to an average of 1.26 children during her lifetime.

The share of foreign-language speaking mothers among women who have given birth has grown almost throughout the 2000s. Their share is now around 16 %, compared with only 4 % in 2000. The largest foreign-language groups are Russian (3,804 births), Arabic (2,479) and Somali (2,259).

Senior meetings are organised for 70- and 80-yearolds in Uusikaarleby and Vaasa

In May, the Wellbeing Services County of Ostrobothnia organises senior meetings for 70- and 80-year-olds who do not receive other regular help, such as home care. At the senior meetings, the elderly receive tips for promoting health and functional capacity, but also for support for living at home. The senior meetings are mainly aimed at these age groups, but other seniors are also welcome to participate.

"It is a good idea to come to a senior meeting, because you can meet your own area's senior adviser and you can also get information about the activities and objectives of the senior counselling service. You will also find out in which matters you can contact the senior adviser. During the senior meeting, you also have the opportunity to fill in a self-assessment form to get an idea of your own health," says Annika Tetrault, Coordinating Ward Nurse for Health Services for the Elderly.

The program includes the importance of diet

The program at the senior meetings varies slightly, but at all meetings you will receive information about the importance of diet as you get older, exercise, how to prevent falls, assistive devices and senior counselling activities. The program also includes break gymnastics.

The senior meetings take a summer break and then return in August and September. Senior meetings are organised in all municipalities of the Wellbeing Services County of Ostrobothnia in either Finnish or Swedish. The date and time will be announced in August.

THL: Obesity in Finland is already causing major problems – now is the time for societal action

The BMI of about 1.2 million adults exceeds the obesity threshold (30 kg/m2). 30% of women and 27% of men are obese. Obesity is most common among people aged 40–64, of whom one in three has obesity.

Waist obesity is even more common and affects almost every second adult. The limit value for waist obesity is considered to be a waist circumference of more than 90 cm for women and more than 100 cm for men.

Obesity and abdominal obesity have become more common among people of working age, i.e. those aged 20–64. Among working-age men, obesity has increased by 3 percentage points and among women by 4 percentage points compared to 2017. A medium-sized man has gained 1.6 kg and a woman by 1.8 kg.

This data is based on THL's Healthy Finland study, in which 10,000 randomly selected people aged 20 and over were invited to a comprehensive health examination. Of these, 5,800 (58% of those invited) took part in the health check.

"Obesity is becoming more common and the problems it causes are exploding. Obesity costs the health care system an additional billion euros every year. Comprehensive measures from society are needed at the latest now to stop population obesity. Such measures can be, for example, taxes and marketing restrictions because the food is unhealthy," says Associate Professor Annamari Lundqvist, who led the study.

Lidl: The cheapest grocery store in all cities – shopping cart up to 20% cheaper than competitors

"We believe that transparency and fair competition benefit consumers," says Forsström. "That's why we want to open our shopping cart comparisons to everyone and challenge other operators to do their comparisons in the same way."

The Finnish Medical Association maintains its position: Euthanasia will not be legalised

The Finnish Medical Association will not change its position on euthanasia. The delegation of the Finnish Medical Association decided to keep the Association's position unchanged at its meeting on Thursday 16.5.2024.

According to the decision, the Finnish Medical Association continues to oppose the legalisation of euthanasia and the obligation for doctors as a profession to perform procedures whose primary purpose is to accelerate the death of a patient.

According to the Finnish Medical Association, euthanasia is an irreversible procedure that strongly tests the ethical principles of doctors, and its effects may have significant consequences on, for example, the coping of doctors and the equality of patients.

In addition, the Finnish Medical Association does not believe that the Finnish healthcare system is currently ready to legalise euthanasia.

Confederation of Finnish Industries Business Cycle Barometer: Business outlooks remain gloomy

Based on the April Business Cycle Barometer of the Confederation of Finnish Industries EK, Finnish companies' assessments of the economic situation have remained at the level of crisis times. Non-financial corporations' business cycle expectations have risen slightly from last January's survey, but are still clearly minor. The economic downturn is hitting construction and industry in particular. Service sectors, in turn, have continued to support the Finnish economy and especially employment in recent months.

"The prolonged weakening economic cycle has hit corporate profitability hard. The operations of companies were also affected by large-scale strikes organised by the trade union movement, which came up when asked about obstacles to growth. The strikes caused harm, especially in industry. Based on the respondent companies, no easing in profitability development is expected in the coming months either, so the difficult times will continue at least until Midsummer," says Sami Pakarinen, Director General of the Confederation of Finnish Industries.

Production and sales have declined in recent months. Companies expect the decline to continue over the next three months. In manufacturing and services, production is expected to start growing in six months' time. The decline in output is already clearly reflected in employment in the private sector. Enterprises' estimates of the development of personnel numbers will continue to be subdued also in the coming months.

"Employment has been declining for several months now. When we know that employment will only react to production with a delay, the turn for better employment will take place next year," Pakarinen continues.

The main obstacle to growth is still insufficient demand. Half of the respondents reported insufficient demand as an obstacle to growth. Problems with the availability of skilled labour have continued to ease as a result of the downturn.

A new tax: The Greens wants an EU-tax

The Greens are advocating for the EU to have the ability to levy taxes, which would allow it to become more financially independent and have more resources to address pressing issues. They want the EU to have more power and autonomy compared to the member states

The summer pedestrian street will open on Monday 29.4 and will be open until 16.9. The closure of the street area will begin on Thursday 25 April, and the terraces of the pedestrian street will be built during the weekend of 27–28 April. (vaasa.fi)

VAMK recognised as an Elite Athlete Friendly University

The Finnish Olympic Committee has awarded Vaasa University of Applied Sciences with the quality mark of an elite athlete friendly university, as evidence of comprehensive consideration of athletes' needs during their studies. The recognition also highlights the longstanding collaboration with the Vaasa Region Sports Academy. VAMK is one of the five Finnish universities of applied sciences that have received this recognition.

New Traffic Insurance Law Makes Many New Vehicles Mandatory to Insure

The reform of the Traffic Insurance Act comes into effect on June 1st, 2024, bringing several changes. Under the new law, many previously uninsured vehicles will require insurance. Operating these vehicles without insurance will be illegal.

The new mandatory insurance applies to, among others, electric scooters, senior scooters, and all rental electric kick scooters. These vehicles must be insured if they weigh over 25 kg (55 lbs) or can travel faster than 25 km/h (15.5 mph).

Electric Bicycles are an Exception

Electric bicycles are exempt from the 25 kg and 25 km/h limits. The insurance requirement doesn't apply to electric bicycles that:

Require pedaling to operate

Have motor assistance that cuts off at 25 km/h

Have a motor with a maximum power of 250 W

Other electric bicycles follow the same insurance requirement as other electric vehicles.

Driving Uninsured is Prohibited

Unregistered vehicles must have valid traffic insurance whenever they are in use. Vehicles in storage do not require traffic insurance. If a vehicle is not insured, it is illegal to operate. Driving uninsured poses a significant risk, as a driver who neglects insurance will be entirely without compensation in case of an accident. Additionally, a penalty fee must be paid for driving without insurance.

Traffic Insurance Offers Broader Coverage in Finland

Finnish traffic insurance provides a wider range of compensation compared to many other countries. Antti Tuulensuu, Head of Claims at the Finnish Motor Insurers' Centre, reminds us that mandatory traffic insurance in many other countries doesn't cover the driver's own injuries.

Traffic insurance can be purchased from any insurance company that sells it. Since the insurance content is defined by law, traffic insurance is the same across all insurance companies.

Kela Proposes a General **Practitioner - Nurse Colla**borative Model

The History of healthcare reimbursements in Finland dates back to 1967, when Kela began reimbursing the costs of private specialist visits, aiming to facilitate access to specialist care. As of the beginning of 2024, Kela reimbursements have been decided to be increased. The goal of the new Kela reimbursement model is to improve access to primary care and the continuity of care. There are currently no detailed plans regarding the continuation of Kela reimbursements for current specialist visits.

The benefits of continuity in patient-physician relationships were also recognized in the late 1980s in the Kela-funded general practitioner model as part of the Ministry of Social Affairs and Health's general practitioner trials. Two other general practitioner

trials were carried out by reorganizing the activities of health centers to operate on a population responsibility basis and by making physicians' working hours flexible. In all three general practitioner trials, the activities were compared to conventional health center operations.

In Kela's general practitioner pilot project from 1985 to 1993, private practitioners committed to seeing patients within 3 weekdays. Kela paid reimbursements to general practitioners based on the population size, age structure, and physician's experience. Specialist visits and laboratory and radiology costs were covered by Kela to medical centers. General practitioner services as well as laboratory and imaging tests were free of charge to patients. Continuity of patient-physician relationships improved most for individuals without occupational health care. In addition, through specialist consultations in hospital sectors, the use of emergency services was reduced, and referral practices to hospital clinics were modified.

The new Kela reimbursement model could be based on a general practitioner nurse collaborative model. Any resident of the welfare area could choose, if desired, a general practitioner who operates in the private sector as their primary healthcare service provider, along with a nurse as their collaborator, instead of a welfare area health center. This would lighten the workload of the welfare area, and overlapping activities would not be supported by Kela reimbursements. Other professionals (such as physiotherapists, mental health nurses, psychologists, or social workers) from either the private sector or the welfare area could support the team

A general practitioner - nurse collaborative pair operating under the new Kela reimbursement model would follow regionally agreed-upon care escalation and care pathways. Diagnostic services would be provided by the welfare area or equivalent service providers at the same cost.



- You can search for Road Churches using the map search and selecting your own summer vacation route to see which churches fall along the way.
- You can also browse the list of Road Churches and search for churches by location or church type (wooden, concrete and stone churches). Church opening hours vary, so always check our website on the church's own page. Most churches are open from 5.6.-20.8. from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., but some Road Churches serve visitors all year round. Churches may offer worship services as well as other events such as concerts and meditation. Finland's first Road Churches opened in the early 1990s, initially in a few churches in Northern Finland. The idea of open-door churches, which originated in Germany, has since become widespread. Both Evan-gelical Lutheran and Orthodox churches are involved, and new churches join every year. In addi-tion, you can find information about Road Churches on Facebook and Instagram on account @tiekirkot. Mysterious moss giants take over Lasipalatsi Square

A green moss giant with skis and poles has arrived at Amos Rex's domes, ready to explore unfamiliar terrain. Wanderer sees the world as being best explored by travelling, but also with the sense of touch — especially the touch of the hand. That may be why the giant is moving two fingers across the palm of his other hand, forming the sign that means to walk or to wander.

Wanderer is one of four bright-green, giant-like figures who have temporarily set up camp in the courtyard at Lasipalatsi Square and on the terrace of Bio Rex. Kim Simonsson's (b. 1974) are about four metres high and communicate with each other through Finnish sign language. They have been acquired for Konstsamfundet, which has one of Finland's most extensive private art collections.

The moss giants' long journey home passes through the centre of Helsinki
The giants – Wanderer, Collector,

Friendship and Bringer of Light – are on their way home to the forest. During the summer, they will take a break at Lasipalatsi Square, after which they will gradually contiWnue to their final destination: a leafy forest glade at Amos Anderson's summer residence, Söderlångvik manor on Kimito Island. There they will stay permanently, gradually becoming part of the forest ecosystem.

"I had a vision of a large moss figure in the forest, so people would accidentally meet a friendly giant in the woods. That dream will now become a reality, with the four giants moving to a forest glade at Söderlångvik," Simonsson says.

The moss giants will be discoverable in the forest at Söderlångvik from spring 2025 onwards.

Simonsson describes his giants as utopian moss children. He has given each individual in the group their own specific task, with each task being equally important. One carries tools, while another has skis on his back. It is also worth paying attention to the moss giants' hands, which play an important role: they communicate with each other, and with the outside world in sign language.

Sculptor Kim Simonsson lives and works in the artists' village of Fiskars in Western Uusimaa. He has been working with ceramic moss figures for almost a decade – the moss giants are his most large-scale works so far.


The Moss Giants will be at Lasipalatsi Square 29 April–20 October 2024. The exhibition is curated by Kai Kartio.

The Heat Will Kill You First: A Gripping Look at Our Scorching Future

Jeff Goodell's "The Heat Will Kill You First: Life and Death on a Scorched Planet" is a stark and unsettling exploration of the escalating threat of extreme heat. ties and developing countries are often disproportionately impacted by extreme heat, lacking the resources to adapt. This raises important questions about environmental justice and the need for global cooperation.



April 2024 Marks Record Global Tempe-

In an alarming trend, April 2024 has been recorded as the warmest April globally in the data record, surpassing all previous records. According to data from the ERA5 surface air tempera-ture, the average global temperature for April reached 15.03°C. This marks a significant increase of 0.67°C above the 1991-2020 average for April and 0.14°C above the previous record set in April 2016. Notably, this is the eleventh consecutive month to claim the title of the warmest in the ERA5 data record for its respective month.

Comparing to the pre-industrial reference period (1850-1900), April 2024 was a staggering 1.58°C warmer, highlighting the rapid pace of global warming. Over the past twelve months (May 2023 – April 2024), the global-average temperature has been the highest on record, ex-ceeding the 1991-2020 average by 0.73°C and the pre-industrial average by 1.61°C.

European temperatures for April 2024 were also notably above average, with an average tem-perature of 1.49°C higher than the 1991-2020 average, making it the second warmest April on record for the continent. Eastern European regions experienced the most significant deviations from average temperatures, while Fennoscandia and Iceland saw below-average temperatures.

Outside of Europe, regions experiencing temperatures well above average included northern and northeastern North America, Greenland, eastern Asia, the northwest Middle East, parts of South America, and most of Africa. The weakening El Niño in the eastern equatorial Pacific did little to mitigate marine air temperatures, which remained unusually high.

The global sea surface temperature (SST) for April 2024 over 60°S–60°N set a new record at 21.04°C, slightly below the March 2024 record of 21.07°C. This marks the thirteenth consecutive month where the SST has been the warmest in the ERA5 data record for its respective month of the year.

Temperature anomalies were evi-

dent across Europe, with western Russia, eastern Ukraine, and Türkiye experiencing particularly warm anomalies. Conversely, below-average temperatures prevailed over most of Fennoscandia.

Internationally, northern and northeastern North America, Greenland, and parts of Asia saw temperatures significantly above average, with some areas experiencing heatwaves. South America and Africa also recorded above-average temperatures, with extreme heat conditions in the Sahel region early in the month.

In contrast, Australia experienced below-average temperatures, as did parts of the Middle East, Iran, and Pakistan. Northern Siberia and southern South America also saw below-average tem-peratures.

The continued rise in marine air temperatures, despite the weakening El Niño, is cause for con-cern, with record-high SSTs persisting over much of the tropics and other ocean basins. This warming trend underscores the urgent need for global climate action to mitigate the impacts of climate change.

Exposure to these pollutants is directly linked to respiratory and cardiovascular diseases, including chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), heart attacks, and strokes. Climate change also poses a growing threat to waterborne diseases. Melanosis Coli: A Benign Colonic Pigmentation Disorder

Melanosis coli, also known as pseudomelanosis coli, is a frequent finding during colonoscopy, characterized by brown or black mucosal pigmentation of the colon. This article reviews the etiology, often linked to laxative abuse, particularly anthraquinones, as well as the pigment composition (lipofuscin) and differentiation from melanin. We discuss the asymptomatic nature, typical endoscopic appearance, and the absence of established treatment or significant complications. The article concludes by addressing the inconclusive evidence regarding a potential association with colorectal cancer.

Melanosis coli is a benign disorder characterized by the deposition of pigment within the colonic mucosa. Despite its name, the pigment responsible is not melanin, but rather lipofuscin, a byproduct of cellular wear and tear. This article delves into the etiology, clinical presentation, endoscopic features, management, and the ongoing debate regarding its association with colorectal cancer.

Etiology:

The most common risk factor for melanosis coli is the long-

term use of certain laxatives, particularly those containing anthraquinones. Examples include senna, cascara sagrada, rhubarb, aloe vera, and frangula. Anthraquinones are believed to stimulate melanogenesis, a process that mistakenly leads to lipofuscin deposition in macrophages within the colonic lamina propria. Other proposed causes include chronic inflammatory bowel disease and heavy metal exposure, but evidence is limited.

Symptoms:

Melanosis coli is typically asymptomatic. It is often incidentally discovered during colonoscopy performed for unrelated reasons.

Endoscopic Findings:

Colonoscopy reveals characteristic brown or black mucosal pigmentation, usually in a patchy or marbled pattern, predominantly affecting the right colon. The pigment does not cause any structural changes to the colonic wall.

Treatment:

Melanosis coli itself does not require specific treatment. The primary approach involves identifying and addressing the underlying cause, such as discontinuing anthraquinone-containing laxatives. Alternative laxatives like fiber supplements or osmotic agents can be considered.

Complications:

Melanosis coli is not associated with any significant complications. It does not cause inflammation, bleeding, or obstruction


Association with Cancer:

The potential link between melanosis coli and colorectal cancer remains a subject of debate. While some studies suggest a higher prevalence of melanosis in patients with colorectal polyps or cancer, others haven't found a clear association. More research is needed to determine if melanosis coli is a risk factor or merely an incidental finding in these patients.

Conclusion:

Melanosis coli is a benign colonic pigmentation disorder most commonly linked to anthraquinone laxative use. It is asymptomatic and diagnosed on colonoscopy. Management focuses on addressing the underlying cause, and the condition carries no significant complications. The potential association with colorectal cancer requires further investigation.

New Kaisantunneli tunnel opened for cyclists and pedestrians in Helsinki

The new Kaisantunneli tunnel in the heart of Helsinki opened its doors to cyclists and pedestrians on Sunday 4 May 2024, just in time for the start of National Cycling Week. The approximately 220-metre-long tunnel runs under the railway yard of Helsinki railway station and connects Kaisaniemi Park with Oodi and Kansalaistori square. In the old days, the cycling distance between these points south of the railway station was 600 metres. And at several traffic lights we had to wait.

The tunnel has been designed especially with the needs of cyclists in

mind, but it is also possible to walk through it. It has its own bike lane, a bike lift and a parking space for about a thousand bikes called the Bike Garage. However, this is not yet open. In the future, a bicycle repair shop will also be located in Pyörätalli.

For pedestrians, the tunnel offers an unobstructed and easy access to Kaisaniemi Park and Oodi. Stairs have been built at the Oodi end of the tunnel to access the train platforms. 40 bike frame locking racks have also been built on the Kaisaniemi park side.


The construction of the Kaisantunnel has taken three years and its costs have risen from the original EUR 25 million to EUR 32 million. However, the project has gone according to plan and there have been no disruptions in traffic.

The new Kaisantunneli tunnel is a significant improvement to the traffic system in the heart of Helsinki, and it will certainly make it easier for cyclists and pedestrians to move around.

Women's Voice project: Stories of a thousand women added to the biographical library At least 50 stories related to Vaasa!

The history of Finnish society and culture has largely been built on people's actions and influence, but the role of women in this story has often been neglected. The actions, influences and life experiences of women have been surprisingly little recorded in the collective memory. To change this, the Women's Voice project has been born, which aims to make women's stories and influence part of the Finnish historical narrative.

The Women's Voice online publication, launched in 2017 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Finland's independence, is part of the effort launched by the Finnish Women's League to produce extensive material on the lives of Finnish women and their impact on society. At the heart of the project is the desire to produce and disseminate

information about what women have done, how they have contributed to the development of society, how they have lived and how they have overcome life's challenges.

In spring 2024, the thousandth biography was published, and many more have been added since then. At least fifty stories tell about women from Vaasa or women whose lives are connected to our city.

Mention should be made of a few well-known Vaasa residents whose biography can be found in the Women's Voice library: Irma Rewell, Ritva Hyöky, Eeva Kauppi, Alexandra Frosterus-Såltin, Rosina Heikel,

Diverse participation in the online publication is welcome, and national, local and family women are welcome to participate. The aim is to highlight different stories and experiences: everyday heroines, those who have toiled in organisational work, visible and invisible, loud and silent. We want to compile material that reflects the diverse contribution of Finnish women to society and culture.

You can write new biographical articles for the Women's Voice online publication or copy previously published articles in the journals of women's organisations, as long as the original publisher has permission to republish. In addition, we challenge organisations and individual citizens to participate in collecting and documenting women's stories in their own communities. The aim is to make the Women's Voice project a show of women's strength and at the same time create a unique set of data on the lives of Finnish women.

New national E-library: Expectations and reality far apart

The long-awaited nationwide E-library has finally opened, but it does not live up to expectations at all. The selection of books is very limited and many languages are completely missing. Logging in is difficult and apparently requires online banking credentials every time. The service does not yet correspond at all to the possibilities offered by ordinary libraries.


Lack of books and limited selection

There are only hundreds of books in the library, which corresponds to only a small part of the shelves of a real library. The selection of books is also very limited, and there are only a few dozen books in Swedish. It is understandable that many Swedish-speaking municipalities are not involved in the project, but that does not make the service nationwide.

Usage problems and limited availability

Logging in to the e-library is difficult and requires bank codes or something similar every time. A better option would be to have one-time credentials, after which the user would receive automatic access. The only function that succeeds smoothly is the press side. There are several magazines and daily newspapers available, such as Apu Anna, Seura and many hobby magazines, such as TM and MikroBitti. The daily press is published in Kauppalehti and The future of rural areas. The range is nowhere near the level of Press-reader.

About 15% of Finns cannot access the e-library even by paying. This is shameful when talking about nationwide service. Of course, the service is free of charge for everyone else.

Lack of additional features

The e-library does not have many of the features that regular libraries offer. For example, there will be no notification of the end of the loan period, and the number of reservations is limited. It can also be difficult to find your favorite books, as not all books are available.

The loan period is 2 weeks. Should we try the Archive.org method in Finland that the loan period is one hour, i.e. you can read the book when you have time, and then borrow it once when it's time? With a short loan period, books would suffice even with a

limited number of books.

The nationwide e-library is disappointing. It does not live up to expectations and is usable only within certain limits. Hopefully, the service will develop in the future and better meet the needs of Finns. The impression is that this has been opened completely unfinished,

The driving force behind the e-library is the National Library of Finland in cooperation with public libraries.

By the way, the other services of the National Library of Finland are world-class. Hardly any other country has such comprehensively digitised historical newspapers and books as Finland,



The National Library of Finland is one of Finland's most important institutions. The monumental building of the National Library of Finland is located opposite Helsinki Cathedral. And we can be sure that the National Library of Finland will get a working version of the E-library for us.

Soil Products, Compost Soil and Legionella Bacteria: Warnings and Tips



Home gardeners, be careful!

Handling soil and compost products may pose a health risk as they may contain legionella bacteria. This is not a new concern — in 2023, soil was identified as a source of infection in five cases of legionellosis, out of a total of 54 cases. This begs the question: What should we know about legionella bacteria, their history and treatment?

Legionella bacteria are named after an American legionnaire meeting held in 1976. Many participants fell ill with pneumonia . After the epidemic, bacteria of the genus Legionella were found in the hotel's water system. Legionella bacteria are common in natural waters and soil and can cause serious illness to humans, especially in water systems such as showers,

whirlpools and cooling systems.

Legionella bacteria are spread through the respiratory tract through an inhaled aerosol. They can cause severe pneumonia, especially in older people and people with weakened immunity. Symptoms of pneumonia may include fever, cough, shortness of breath, and chest pains. If legionella-induced pneumonia is suspected, it is important to seek medical attention immediately.

Pneumonia caused by legionella is usually treated with antibiotics such as azithromycin or levofloxacin. The effectiveness of treatment is influenced by the general condition of the patient and possible other diseases. In addition, it is important to minimize exposure to legionella bacteria through preventive measures.

When handling soil and compost products, special care should be taken. Avoid blowing them into the air, protect wounds on the hands and wear protective gloves. Wash hands thoroughly after handling and store soil bags away from sunlight. Compliance with preventive measures is key to minimizing the risks posed by legionella bacteria.

Here are the guidelines published by the Finnish Institute for Health and Welfare this spring:

Avoid blowing soil and compost into the air you breathe.

Protect wounds on hands and broken skin.

Wear protective gloves and wash your hands thoroughly at the end.

Open the soil bag with the opening facing away from your face.

Moisten mulch or compost with low water pressure, such as a water jug, if necessary.

Wash from soil or compost material utensils with low water pressure.

Store soil bags out of the sun, as the internal temperature of the bag stored in the sun is between 20°C and 40°C ideal for legionella bacteria to multiply.

If dusting cannot be reduced otherwise, FFP-2 and FFP-3 level protectors protect against exposure. Remember to place the protector snugly on your face. (Source thl.fi)

Don't Juice Up Your Weight Gain: Daily Fruit Juice May Not Be Your Friend



For many, reaching for a glass of 100% fruit juice seems like a healthy choice. However, a new study suggests that daily consumption of fruit juice might be linked to weight gain in both children and adults.

Researchers reviewed dozens of existing studies on fruit juice and body weight. While the results weren't entirely conclusive, some trends emerged.

Children and Weight Gain: The study found a clear link between daily fruit juice intake and increasing Body Mass Index (BMI) in children. Each additional serving of juice per day was associated with a slightly higher BMI gain.

Adults and Weight Gain: The picture for adults was less clear-cut. Studies that didn't account for overall calorie intake showed a connection between daily juice and weight gain. However, studies that considered total calorie consumption did not find a significant association. This suggests that the potential weight gain may be due to the extra calories in juice, not the juice itself.

The Takeaway: While more research is needed, this study adds to growing evidence that suggests limiting sugary drinks, including 100% fruit juice, could be beneficial for weight management.

Here's Why Juice Might Not Be the Best Choice:

- High in Sugar:
 Even though it's natural sugar, fruit juice can be quite concentrated. This means a single serving can contain a significant amount of calories, which can contribute to weight gain.
- Missing Fiber:
 Unlike whole fruit, juice lacks the filling fiber that helps you feel sa-tisfied.
 This can lead to overconsumption of calories throughout the day.

So, what should you do?

- Focus on Whole Fruits: Choose whole fruits instead of juice whenever possible. Whole fruits provide essential vitamins, minerals, and fiber, keeping you feeling fuller for longer.
- Limit Juice Intake: If you do enjoy juice, make it an occasional treat, not a daily habit. Consider diluting it with water to reduce the sugar content.
- Be Mindful of Portion Sizes: Even with whole fruit, be mindful of portion sizes.

Remember: Water is always the best beverage choice for hydration and overall health.

New Exhibition Opening at Kuntsi Museum for Modern Art: "Bodies and Moments – Three Perspectives on the Kuntsi Collection"

On May 5, 2024, Kuntsi Museum for Modern Art will unveil its latest exhibition, "Bodies and Moments – Three Perspectives on the Kuntsi Collection." This exhibition offers a diverse overview of the foundation's collection from the viewpoints of three curators. Featuring nearly 200 works, the exhibition occupies the entire museum space and includes pieces loaned from sources outside the foundation's collection.

Every three years, Kuntsi Foundation, established in 1970, presents an exhibition ba-sed on its collection at its eponymous museum. The current exhibition, "Bodies and Moments – Three Perspectives on the Kuntsi Collection," is curated by the foundat-ion's board members: Dr. Leevi Haapala, Dean of the Academy of Fine Arts; Teemu Mäki, Chairman of the Artists' Guild in Finland; and Anne-Maj Salin, the Foundation's representative and museum director emerita.

A Surrealist Continuum from Classics to Contemporary Art

Leevi Haapala's section of the exhibition explores the transition from surrealism to contemporary art. Highlighting surrealism within the Kuntsi collection, Haapala traces its influence on contemporary works and subsequent art trends. The exhibition be-gins with European surrealism classics and progresses to contemporary art, featuring artists exploring urban life, constructivism, and pop art.

In addition to collection pieces, Haapala has selected works by Helsinki-based con-temporary artist Antti Ruuhela to engage in dialogue with the collection.

A Multidimensional Perspective
Teemu Mäki's section is divided
into four themes, addressing the
celebration of eve-ryday life, the
grotesque body, societal statements in art, and the outer essence
of humanity. Mäki's curation spans
sections titled "An Ode to Everyday
Life – Paradise Is Here and Now," "A
Grotesque Body (is a Living Body),"
"Art as a Hammer – Beyond Human," and "More Than Human."

Mäki's section features works from the Artists' Guild in Finland's collections and pie-ces loaned by artist Eeva Honkanen, as well as a work by the curator himself. The loans aim to enrich the section and demonstrate the relevance of the foundation's col-lection to contemporary art.

Central Works Narrating Moments and Encounters

Anne-Maj Salin has selected a collection of iconic works for the exhibition, focusing on moments, situations, and atmospheres depicted in the artwork. Salin emphasizes how familiar pieces can evoke new experiences and thoughts in different contexts, underscoring the enduring relevance of quality artwork.

Approximately two hundred works will be on display at the exhibition, showcasing both Finnish contemporary art and rarely exhibited pieces by international artists from the foundation's collection. The exhibition runs from May 5 to October 6, 2024, at Kuntsi Museum for Modern Art. (VAASA.FI)

Kaleva Games in Vaasa 27-30.6

Vaasa prepares for the Kaleva Games: Karlsplan is being prepared for competition

he Finnish Athle-Championships, Kalevan, will take place in Vaasa on 27-30 June 2024, according to a press release from the city. It is one of Finland's leading national sports events, and the City of Vaasa has been preparing for the event for several years.

The Kaleva Games are expected to attract about 20,000 visitors to Vaasa. The implementation of Kaleva Competition 2018 - 3000 m, Jyväskylä the event requires significant cooperation from the

The world is capable of forcing Russia into peace and into compliance with international security norms. Russia has nothing to oppose the world ma-jority: despite all of Putin's lies, he depends on his environment - in the broad sense of this word. He also depends on the international environ-ment. No one in the world is interested in

this war, except the aggressor, and everyone is actually aware of this. The Peace Summit is a format that will not allow Putin to lie anymore. And without his lies, he is absolutely nothing. And I thank everyone in the world who is helping us organize the Summit and who is showing their leadership to bring real peace closer.

Today I spoke with the President of Côte d'Ivoire and invited him to the Peace Summit, and I am grateful for his willingness to participate. I also met today with the Marshal of the Senate of Poland – I thanked her for the support, told her about the situation in Ukraine and, of course, we di-scussed our preparations for the Summit. I am grateful to everyone who supports Ukraine and a real honest peace!

I thank everyone who fights and works for our country and people!
Glory to Ukraine!

Russia threatens to attack **England**

This is an official text from the Russian Foreign Ministry

Press release on the summons to the UK Foreign Office On May 6, the British ambassador to Russia, Nigel Casey, was summoned to the Foreign Office to make a strong protest against the latest statement by British Foreign Secretary David Cameron in an interview with the Reuters news agency about Ukraine's right to strike Russian territory with British weapons. The ministry firmly pointed out to Ambassador Casey that Cameron's hostile outburst directly contradicts the British side's previous assurances during the transfer of long-range cruise missiles to the Kiev regi-

me that they would under no circumstances be used to strike Russian territory. The head of the State Department thus distanced himself from this position and acknowledged that his country was de facto a party to the conflict. The ambassador was told that the Russian side regarded Cameron's words as evidence of a serious escalation and confirmation of London's growing involvement in hostilities on the Kiev side. Nigel Casey was warned that all British military installations and equipment on Ukrainian territory and beyond could be hit in response to Ukrainian attacks on Russian territory with British weapons. The ambassador was invited to consider the inevitable catastrophic consequences of such hostile actions on the part of London and to reject in the strongest and most unequivocal manner the belligerent, provocative statements of the head of the Foreign Office.

RUSSIA'S STRANGE DIPLOMATIC LANGUAGE

The Kremlin mocks its opponents

When tensions between the two countries increase - as in recent years between Russia and Ukraine - it is common for the aggressor to ridicule its counterpart. We have seen examples of this. Russian state television is doing its best to spoil Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky and the Ukrainian leadership. According to the Kremlin, Zelensky is a Nazi, a drug addict, a clown, a liar, a traitor, a criminal, a psychopath.

It is important to note that these attacks are false and unjustified. Zelenskyy is a democratically elected leader who has shown great courage and determination in the face of Russian aggression. He is overwhelmingly supported by the Ukrainian people and widely respected by world leaders. That he is a Nazi is not of this world, Zelensky is Jewish and one of the pillars of Nazism is hatred of Jews. But Russia thinks anyone who opposes Russia's aggression is a Nazi.

The Kremlin's use of derogatory adjectives against Zelensky is a sign of despair and weakness. They cannot defeat Ze-

lenskyy on the battlefield, so they resort to personal attacks in an at-tempt to discredit him. However, these attacks only hook and further strengthen Zelenskyy's determination and the unity of the Ukrainian people.

Then there is reason enough to say that the President of Ukraine is not the only one exposed to derogatory and mocking adjectives. The German leader is a "sausage maker" and the leader of the USA is a senile dementia elderly.

This is not a new pheno-

menon. In particular, the word clown seems to be popular in the Krem-lin when someone dares to oppose plans to conquer Russia. On 26.11.1939, a few days before the start of the Winter War, Pravda published the following sensational article about Finnish Prime Minister Aimo Kaarlo Cajander:

"Finland's government fears appearing before the country's parliament. Instead, Prime Minister Cajander, on November 23, happily performed at a concert. The music played, the prime mi-nister gave a speech. Finland's citizens must be entertained in their current sad situation. Cajan-der tried

to entertain the audience as best he could. He displayed clownish talent. Cajander tur-ned the concert venue into a simple circus arena. Like Pelle Jöns, he somersaulted, spoke non-sense, stood on his head, walked around the arena on his hands.

First, he dragged out several portraits of Russian tsars onto the arena and bowed down to these images. These humble bows he performed with the ingrained subservience of a born servant. He spoke of 'the policy beneficial to Finland, followed by Alexander I and Alex-

ander II and approved by all the people of Finland.' Then Pelle Jöns stood on his head and threatened the Soviet Union with one of his feet because Moscow was thinking of threatening Finland's independence. It was truly a majestic attitude!

It is known that the Russian tsars, whether named Alexander or Nikolai, suppressed all attempts by the Finnish people to gain independence in every way. The tsarist policy, which aimed to oppress, subjugate, and paralyze the people, was only accepted by the reactionary-minded,

But Pelle Jöns in the role of prime minister, behold, he is farsighted. He is a politician who has been schooled by the far-sighted Beck, by the clear-sighted Moscicki. May he experience how they feel, these Polish Pelle Jöns, who have forever lost their commitment. Soon enough, Cajander may have the opportunity to realize that it is not the Finnish government's puppets who are foresighted, but Estonia's, Latvia's, and Lithuania's current leaders, who have concluded agree-ments with the Soviet Union guaranteeing the independence of

these states.

But Cajander and his cronies cannot avoid giving the Finnish people the answer they increa-singly demand.

Why have you, gentlemen Cajander and your associates, interrupted the nego-tiations? The people have not demanded this of you. Who has demanded that the negotiations be interrupted? Finland's prime minister wriggles like an eel, he cries and snivels and wipes the tears from his dirty face: "As much as we have tried to find a common basis for our negotiat-ions, they have nevertheless been temporarily interrupted. This must be regretted all

the more as Finland sincerely wishes to maintain good relations with all its neighbors." Cajander "regrets"! Cajander "has temporarily" interrupted the negotiations! Cajander sheds crocodile tears. Crocodile tears are said to be the most deceitful, the most vile, the most disgusting in the whole world. But even more repulsive, even more vile, even more deceitful are the tears shed by Pelle Jöns as he imitates the crocodile. It is a perversion of a rep-tile that lacks sharp teeth, that lacks strength, but is full of the cunning and voracity of a little predator.

And yet Cajander and his henchmen will not escape answering the question that the Finnish people increasingly threateningly pose to them, as they see the country being drawn into a shameful and dangerous game by provocateurs. Why have you, Cajander and your gang, in-terrupted the negotiations? You are "independent" (?) only of the Finnish people, who in fact seek the friendship of the Soviet people. Who, then, are you dependent on? Whose will do you fulfill, whose instructions do you follow? And Pelle Jöns in the prime minister's office runs anxiously, cowardly around, letting his faded eyes wander in all directions and swearing to God: "Finland has not been in need and has not received instructions from other states. By God, it has not received any!" A clown's oath, invoking God!


The receipt for "foreign states' instructions" having been fulfilled has been published. It is found in the English imperialist press's approval of Cajander's speech. The Daily Herald pats its Finnish Pelle Jöns friendly on the shoulder: "you have done well, dear brother".

Can one then be surprised that Cajander and his entourage have not found "a common basis" with the Soviet government? Pelle Jöns performs his somersaults on the warlike imperialism's "general platform," lets the jazz orchestra clang, lets the saxophone jam, lets the circus director's whip whistle.

Will this political circus continue for a long time? We must hope: not too long. We must hope that the Finnish people will not allow puppets like Cajander and his associates to steer Finland's ship of state further towards the brink of destruction, where Beck and Moscicki have suffered shipwreck."

Bertel Gripenberg: A Traditionalist Poet with a Controversial Legacy

Bertel Gripenberg (1878-1947) was a prominent Finnish-Swedish poet during the early 20th century. While renowned for his formal and technical skills, he held traditional and re-actionary views on poetry and society, making him a controversial figure even in his own time

Gripenberg's early work, exemplified by collections like "Vida vägar" (1904) and "Galler-grinden" (1905), consisted of passionate love poetry, considered daring for its time. His sub-sequent period, often regarded as his strongest, saw a shift towards ethical themes, evident in works like "Aftnar i Tavastland" (1911).

The Finnish Civil War of 1918 profoundly impacted Gripenberg, inspiring works like "Un-der fanan" (1918), which glorified the war and demonized the Red opponents. This, coupled with his anti-democratic and anti-populist stance, solidified his position as a controversial figure.

Gripenberg continued to publish poetry collections throughout his career, including "Sista ronden" (1941). In 1925, he released "Den hemliga glöden" (under the pseudonym Åke Erik-son), a parody of modernist poetry that inadvertently revealed new facets of his own work.
